## *Keep tellin' the Story...*

### *Not-So-Extreme- Makeover: The Summer of Blessing*

Years ago I remember hearing someone say that God creates us for praise. I've liked that. I think that's true. We've been blessed with life and this world and all the crazy people (and creatures -- have you seen a giraffe?) in it.

As Jesus comes to the end of his life, he says to the disciples (and us) in John 15, "I came that my joy may be in you and your joy may be full." And despite all the recent hoopla around Indianapolis, I'm pretty sure that this joy is not what comes by way of an Extreme Makeover!

This summer, both inside and outside of our walls, we will focus our attention on blessing. It's something we already know something about around Broadway. Any community that says it "seeks, welcomes and values all people" knows something about blessing -- the blessing of being alive, of being in community, and of celebrating those blessings.

We created (and opened) some new space up at Broadway. It's right inside the main entrance. Folks who have been around Broadway will know it as the old "Thrifty Shop" space. Now it will be a place where ideas and creativity are exchanged. The walls have paper on them. There are markers around the room, and you are invited to stop in and post your ideas. There is an order to what we are doing in this Jubilee Summer Space. First of all, on three of the walls, we are asking people to write down the names of people they know and the gifts they have, things they care about, and things they are willing to do. We were talking about a conversation that De'Amon had over two years ago with someone in the neighborhood who now worships at Broadway. One of

the things that De'Amon remembered was that Lee was interested in hosting a barbecue for fathers who are his neighbors. So that was one of the best names that went up on the board.

That leads to the first responsibility/calling of this Jubilee Summer -- that is to say, "NAMING." It is alive in the individuals who make up our life together in this place. We put up the names of artists and cooks -- people like Avis, Al, Gary, Jerrilyn, Troy, Mari, Keisha, Kyla, Deloris, Seana, Eric. But they are just the very small part of a beginning. We hope that you (Yes, you!) will stop by and write on the walls -- the things you have heard and seen in the lives of others around. Also, if you see something you are interested in or know someone who is, you can connect people.

So, what comes after NAMING? This is the heart of the matter; it is "BLESSING." I've read a wonderful little book by Gary Gunderson and Larry Pray entitled "Leading Causes of Life." BLESSING is one of the central foci of the book. I like it because once we can name where we know and see the Spirit active in the lives of others, we can go and offer a blessing. Terri and Martha who run the program are "BLESSERS in Chief!" (but all of us can do it). They will go and lay hands on people and bless them and thank them for what they are doing -- for the sharing of their gifts. We aren't looking to create things here as much as we are looking to recognize the power and the presence of the Spirit of God. But blessing can also happen in other ways than laying on of hands (though that is a personal favorite of mine). We will also print up certificates,

like Keisha Maxxison did over five years ago when she took a certificate to each of thirty gardeners around the neighborhood and thanked them for beautifying the neighborhood. That is a form of blessing.

Finally, the next work -- once we have named and blessed -- is what I would like to call "THE HOLY WORK OF ENCOURAGEMENT." Though it is perhaps understood more simply as "CONNECTING." This work -- this good and holy work -- strives to find ways to surround those with gifts and passions for the working out of those gifts - with a community of fellow citizens/members who will pray for them, encourage them, and walk alongside them in living out their dream. Many people will already have people in their lives who do this, but can't we always use more?

Finally, I mentioned what is being written on three of those walls in the Jubilee Summer Space. On the fourth wall is just a place for you to write down any old idea that has come to mind. You may not be able to name anyone who is actually going to do it, but it still has come to mind. Write it up there. Let others see it. Let it marinate. Something good may arise from it. But others need to see it. Share. Build. Play.

It's not an Extreme Makeover -- it's more like entering into the joy of one another. A truly Jubilee Summer!

# Tongue of Fire

## The Voice of John Wesley: A Part Time Church of England Priest & Full Time Radical Enthusiast

I, John Wesley, was born out of the flames of fire and now two centuries later there still remains a fire in my belly. Therefore, I must speak.

Over the years I have seen many things far and wide that impress me about the movement called Methodism. When we joined with the Quakers in attempts to abolish slavery from the earth, we were met with both resistance, fear, and also with great hospitality. When we spread our wings in the early Americas and brought forth the establishing of women preachers, a new day was brought into the colonies. Through the decades that have passed since our little holy club became a movement, we have found ourselves at the crux of social thought and experimentation. At the beginning of the Twenty First Century we find ourselves in a similar place.

The twenty first century has already brought many things to our consciousness. We might think of war in the Middle East, or the genocide in Darfur, or even the environmental crisis as points of entry into our theological discussion as Methodists. These are all worthy of our discussion, but today I must admit an uneasy feeling regarding how we handle our gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender sisters and brothers. We have seen congregations exclude on the basis of sexual orientation from membership in our local churches. We have seen clergy and laity alike legislate that such brothers and sisters are not allowed into full membership among the clergy. We have even defrocked a few who have been so bold as to suggest that God's love is for ALL and that the call of God to ordination is to ALL who will answer, gay or straight.

We never dealt with this topic much in the inception of Methodism, but as time passes new moments give rise to places of theological intersection and introspection.

I would like to say a word of praise and caution to my brothers and sisters at Broadway United Methodist. It is clear to me in all that you do, Broadway, that the idea of seeking, welcoming, and valuing ALL people is not just a catch phrase but a tangible and palpable reality in your common life. Thank you for this, for it truly embraces the spirit from which Methodism found its origins. I am impressed with brothers like Mark DeVore who have reminded us that, indeed, "All means All," and that God's amazing love extends to all people, yea, to all of creation. I wish more of our congregations could catch the blazing fire of which you live out your communal life. For as I once recommended in a sermon, "Catch on fire with enthusiasm and people will come for miles to watch you burn." So, take your enthusiasm for an inclusive body of faith and show with word and action that Methodism has the capacity for a new way of being in this century, one that seeks, welcomes, and values all people.

On equal footing is the challenge to offer loving kindness to all on our journey, including those who may not see the world through the same looking glass. This kind of life, the prophetic life, thus, requires humility. Not that I am suggesting Broadway is proud or arrogant. Simply put, it is the case that all of us must be reminded of our need to live under the mystery of Christ. I submit to you a short word from my sermon A

*Caution Against Bigotry:* "Think not the bigotry of another is any excuse for your own. It is not impossible, that one who casts out devils himself, may yet forbid you so to do. You may observe, this is the very case mentioned in the text. The Apostles forbade another to do what they did themselves. But beware of retorting. It is not your part to return evil for evil. Another's not observing the direction of our Lord, is no reason why you should neglect it. Nay, but let him have all the bigotry to himself. If he forbid you, do not you forbid him. Rather labour, and watch, and pray the more, to confirm your love toward him. If he speak all manner of evil of you, speak all manner of good (that is true) of him."

My brothers and sisters of Broadway we are entering that time of year where we are gathering for holy conferencing at our Annual Conference. I have no doubt that like the days of joining with the Quakers to end slavery, you will be met with resistance and fear, but you will also be met with much hospitality and hope. The movement of Methodism has always been met with such things, so go forth into our conferencing and into the world to love God and your neighbor in both boldness and humility. Amen and Amen!

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# Three Simple Things

Since my arrival at Broadway in January of this year, I have been excited to discover ways in which to communicate effectively the ways in which the Miracle on 29th Street is creating a powerful new model for mission in our neighborhoods. One of the hallmarks of Broadway, throughout its history, has been its connection to the surrounding neighborhood. As I have spent time talking with many of you, as well as many in our neighborhood and city, I have come to realize the ways in which Broadway has had a positive impact on our entire community and city, both inside and outside the church.

Throughout its history, Broadway has adapted to changes in society and leadership, through the development of thoughtful and effective programs and activities. We have been successful in reaching a large number of people and can be proud of the work we have been able to accomplish. We need to celebrate who we are and what we have done.

We are faced with a new set of challenges in today's world that will require new ways of thinking that may take us out of our comfort level and certainly will force us to ask some difficult questions about our current programs and assumptions. This is not new work for the people of Broadway. Didn't we face the challenges of remaining in our present location during the turbulent times in the 60's and 70's; didn't we create new programs and ways of meeting the challenges in our neighborhood; and didn't we revitalize our church and faith when we decided to Seek, Welcome and Value ALL People? I am sure that in each of these struggles it was difficult for us to see the positive outcomes we later achieved. I know from talking to you that these changes brought loss and yet you did it anyway because of your greater belief in God and this church.

Under the thoughtful leadership

of Pastor Mike, Broadway Church is once again working hard to understand the ways in which God is moving both inside and outside our church walls. The process is simple and straightforward in approach but extremely difficult in terms of faith and action. We are being asked to simply do three things:

1. To put aside our assumptions, past successes and failures, and programs/projects.
2. To engage in meaningful conversations with the entire community, while listening carefully for the beauty of God's creation in those with whom we have conversations.
3. To bless the people, institutions, projects and dreams we identify during our conversations.

Simple? Yes, only three steps!  
Difficult and challenging? Yes, we need to change and have faith that God is greater than this church and is also at work in our community!

In order to help us all think constructively about our work as the people of Broadway Church, I offer the following perspective from JR Woodward from Dream Awakener:

- It's not simply how many people come to our church services, but how many people our church serves.
- It's not simply how many people attend our ministry, but how many people have we equipped for ministry.
- It's not simply how many people minister inside the church, but how many minister outside the church.
- It's not simply helping people become more whole themselves, but helping people bring more wholeness to their world. (i.e. justice, healing, relief)
- It's not simply how many ministries we start, but how many

ministries we help.

- It's not simply how many unbelievers we bring into the community of faith, but how many 'believers' we help experience healthy community.
- It's not simply working through our past hurts, but working alongside the Spirit toward wholeness.
- It's not simply counting the resources that God gives us to steward, but counting how many good stewards are we developing for the sake of the world.
- It's not simply how we are connecting with our culture but how we are engaging our culture.
- It's not simply how much peace we bring to individuals, but how much peace we bring to our world.
- It's not simply how effective we are with our mission, but how faithful we are to our God.
- It's not simply how unified our local church is, but how unified is "the church" in our neighborhood, city and world?
- It's not simply how much we immerse ourselves in the text, but how faithfully we live in the story of God.
- It's not simply being concerned about how our country is doing, but being concerned for the welfare of other countries.
- It's not simply how many people we bring into the kingdom, but how much of the kingdom we bring to the earth.

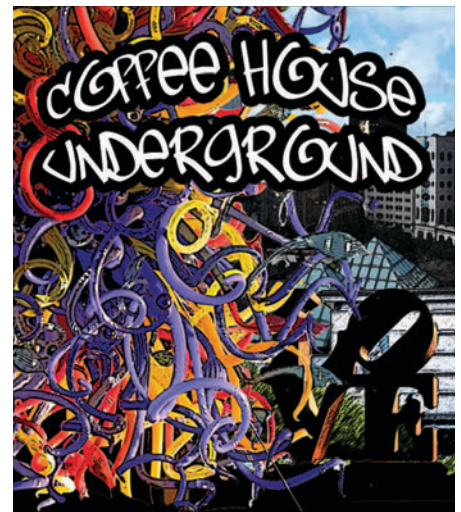
