Predictably Unexpected

I've recently finished reading a book entitled *Predictably Irrational* by an economist named Dan Ariely. He writes about the ways in which things that appear irrational make some sense once you start looking at them more carefully, while they certainly don't look either predictable or rational on the surface.

We had a wonderful meeting of our governing council, Diakonia, in September. Rob Faulkens, the principal of Crispus Attucks, came and talked with us about his ministry in the world, in his stewardship of the school. There is remarkable work going on in that school (ask Rob or one of the people on Diakonia to tell you about what is happening there). We also heard from Scott Barnes, a photographer, who talked with us about his ministry in the world through his art. He told us about an exhibition he is working on that is entitled "Unexpected Hoosiers." The focus seems to be on telling the story of the lives of people who are Hoosiers who one might be surprised to think of as a Hoosier.

I'm so impressed with the ministry of the lives of the people in and around Broadway. There are people who are students, people who are teachers, people who are parents, people who are gardeners, people who are good neighbors, people who are administrators, people who work



in health care, people who advocate for social justice, and people who are encouragers of others. It is an inexhaustible list when I think of the ministry of the people of Broadway in the world.

Sometimes we sell ourselves short. We don't always understand the ways in which we are bearing witness to the life and ministry of Jesus through the ways in which we live and work. When we sat and listened to Rob and Scott this past week, we could see it and hear it, though.

The *Imagine Worship* series has blessed us already this fall -- it is helping us to imagine ministry as something much broader and beyond the ministry that happens in and around our church building. What a blessing.

We have a lot to celebrate. A lot. And we'll have a special day of



celebrating the ministry of Broadway on Consecration Sunday, October 18th. These commitments we make are building up and upon the ministry, the reach, that our congregation has in our neighborhood, in Indianapolis, and beyond.

It is the predictably unexpected ministry of the followers of Jesus that is a real gift we have to offer to the world. So over the next week, take a few minutes and ask someone you know to tell you about something they spend their time doing, at work or at leisure. And then tell someone else what you saw in that person's life. What you will find is predictably unexpected!

Why We Give

Consecration Sunday is Just Around the Corner!

October 18, 2009 is Consecration Sunday. It's the day for those of us who worship here to celebrate our life together at Broadway and to make our financial commitments to the church for the coming year. Over the next few weeks leading up to Consecration Sunday, you will hear several testimonies during worship of why people give. Prior to making this commitment, we thought it might be a good exercise to look at the Scriptures and remember why giving of our finances is part of our Christian life.

If we start in the Old Testament, we find two overriding principles to giving. The first is giving a tithe, or ten percent of what we earn (Leviticus 27:30), and the second is giving our "first fruits" or the best of what we have to offer (Exodus 23:19). Many people use these principles today to guide their giving to the church, making their "tithe" check the first check they write when doing their monthly bills.

The question for many today, however, is "What does Jesus say in the New Testament about giving?" Although Jesus isn't as clear as the Old Testament "rules" in regards to our finances, He did teach more about money than anything else. And since it doesn't appear Jesus personally worried a lot about money, why does this subject take up such a large portion of the Gospels?

One explanation might be that Jesus knew the human heart and knew that money had the ability to control our lives and inhibit our spiritual growth. Over and over, people came to Jesus with questions about life and finances, and Jesus' answers were usually far from what they expected.

To the rich young man following all the commandments, Jesus suggests to sell everything and give to the poor and follow Him (Matthew 19:16-26). In the parable of the rich fool who wants his brother to share his inheritance, Jesus warns of greed and suggests one's life does not consist in the "abundance of our possessions" (Luke 12:12-21). Jesus even tells us that it isn't how much we give, but the sacrifice we make when giving (See the parable of the widow's mite in Luke 21).

Paul sums up the New Testament view of giving well in 2 Corinthians 9:6-7. It says, "Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each person should give what he or she has decided in their heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

Jesus' mantra is consistent; be rich toward God and others, and you will store up treasures for yourself in heaven. God doesn't simply want rule followers, God wants Christ followers who listen to the Holy Spirit and heed the Spirit's call. Our Creator yearns for a people who see need in our world and share their blessings. Broadway has been and continues to be blessed with such people. So, during this time before consecration Sunday, may we all peruse the Gospels and be reminded of why we give.

Lastly, the area of finances is the one place in the Bible God actually encourages us to test God. Malachi 3:10 says, "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this, says the Lord Almighty, and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it."

It's been said that one can't out give God. The more one tends to earnestly "give" to the church and others, the more blessings one seems to be able to see and know. Many of us

can give testimony to this principle. The reason simply might be God's deep desire to bless all people while hoping we become more other-oriented toward God and the people we encounter in this life.

God could have given us a hard and fast rule to follow when it came to giving (e.g., the tithe or tenth) as it was in the Hebrew scriptures. However, the New Testament challenges us in different ways. It implies that God wants relationship with us, not just good rule-followers. So call upon your Savior today! Search your heart and ask God what YOU are to give. Not just to Broadway, but in every area of your life...your time, talents and treasures. October 18th is the day you will decide what "treasures" you will be giving to Broadway this year. It's between you and God. Trust God... Test God in this area of your finances, and see if as you give generously, the Lord doesn't open your eyes to the floodgates of Heaven before you. It's God's promise to all of us!

Rev. Lester Bill

Broadway Minister from 1953 to 1963, Dies at 99



Rev. Lester H. Bill died peacefully at home at Wesley Manor in Frankfort, Indiana, on July 9th, 2009, in his ninety-ninth year. His beloved wife of 68 years, Jane Elizabeth (Barber) Bill, preceded him in death at Wesley Manor four months earlier, on March 13th, 2009. He leaves four children who will miss him dearly: Carolyn (Bob Bullock), Ottawa, Canada; Anita Jane Shekinah, West Des Moines, IA; Eileen, Santa Rosa, CA; and Doug (Risë), Honesdale, PA. Lester's cherished family also includes eight grandchildren and step-grandchildren, and ten great-grandchildren and step-great-grandchildren.

Lester was invited to come to the bustling metropolis of Indianapolis in 1953, where he served as the Minister of Outreach at Broadway Methodist Church for ten fruitful and enriching years. His pastoral work was at the heart of his ministry, as he visited the sick, counseled those who grieved, preached innumerable sermons and performed 232 weddings and 278 funerals by his own count.

At the same time, Lester was a concerned citizen and advocate for civil rights during this time of social ferment and change. He plunged whole-heartedly into the life of the wider community beyond Broadway's walls, taking the courageous path of personal advocacy for peace, and against injustice and discrimination, that he and his life partner, Jane, were to follow for the rest of their days. He served on the Mayor's Commission on Human Rights under three mayors, and on the Indianapolis Church Federation Committee on Human Relations. He was a co-founder of the Mapleton-Fall Creek Neighborhood Association and president of the Crosstown Neighbors Association, working to preserve positive community relations in the interracial neighborhood in which his family lived.

In keeping with his passionate belief that all people of the earth are one, Lester was an active member of the Methodist Federation for Social Action and of the Fellowship of Reconciliation for more than fifty years. He was also a member of the American Civil Liberties Union, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), and the United Nations Association. Lester and Jane together received the John P. Adams Award from the Methodist Federation for Social Action for their work in social justice and peace ministry, and Lester was the recipient of many additional awards throughout his long working life. In 2006, Broadway United Methodist Church created an annual award named in his honor, the Rev. Lester H. Bill Award for Lifetime Christian Service.

Those who knew Lester loved him for his sincerity and humility and admired him for his passionate world view and fearless willingness to live his convictions. His deep faith and bedrock integrity were fundamental to his life and work. He will be sadly missed and greatly honored by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

A memorial service was held at Wesley Manor on September 12th, with tributes offered by Lester's lifelong friends and colleagues from Indianapolis days, Rev. Dr. James Armstrong and Rev. Dr. William Valentine. For those who wish, donations to UNICEF, or to the charity of your choice, would be greatly appreciated.

Tongue of Fire

The Voice of John Wesley: A Part Time Church of England Priest & Full Time Radical Enthusiast

I, John Wesley, was born out of the flames of fire and now two centuries later there still remains a fire in my belly. Therefore, I must speak.

I have been thinking a lot lately about authenticity, being honest with our doubts, our fears, our intellect, and our faith. I have heard many argue in my time and these present times that to question or to inquire about faith through the curiosities of philosophy, science, and logic is a surety towards sin and the devil. I am inclined to disagree. I believe that the mind and heart are linked in such a significant way that God loves and encourages us with the power to seek after and to be sought by the Divine. Questions are not the enemy; they allow us to sink deeper into our faith and to show our honesty and authenticity before God. I think God would rather us ask hard questions than to conform to ready made answers that were not truly brought to us through spiritual insight born of devotion. I am reminded of one of my more memorable thoughts on this topic.

I once said, "When I was young I was sure of everything; in a few years, having been mistaken a thousand times, I was not half so sure of most things as I was before; at present, I am hardly sure of anything but what God has revealed to me."

Certainty in faith and beliefs can breed fear and misunderstanding, which can lead to violence and hatred. This is why I believe that when the community of faith gathers, our deepest questions and mysteries of our faith ought to be allowed to be expressed rather than suppressed. God honors our honesty in worship. This is why I am more than impressed to see one of my Methodist communities at Broadway

UMC exploring the hard questions here recently, such as "Why does God allow children to suffer?" or "Does God punish people?" You are addressing questions that everyone is asking and been too afraid to bring forth into faith communities, let alone in worship. As has been said more recently than myself, I want to encourage you to remain "living the questions." God is present to and with you as you ask, as you seek, and more than anything God brings forth community as you struggle together with the hard questions. Indeed, God is in the questions.

COME TO THE IMAGINARY BAZAAR!

Broadway United Methodist Women invite you to come to the Imaginary Bazaar on Saturday, October 10th from 9:30 a.m. until noon in the Wesley Room. This year, the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries has challenged us to write our own program for a service of pledging or giving, which includes our own missions, our local missions, national missions, and international missions. If you would like to have a favorite mission included, please contact Phyllis Newton. After our program, we will send our copy to the Women's Division. Few other programs will be able to include such ministries as our active prison and reentry ministries. (Go Broadway!) Besides an exciting program, we will fill Christmas stockings for Fletcher Place, clip Campbell's Soup labels for Bashor Home/School in Goshen, and assemble school kits for Taiama High School in Sierra Leone and health kits to be distributed by UMCOR. Kits contain the following:

Health Kits (All new items):

- 1 hand towel
- 1 wash cloth
- 1 large bar bath soap
- 1 sturdy comb (not pocket-size)
- 6 Band-aids
- 1 toothbrush (single, wrapped)
- 1 16-oz. toothpaste (expiration date at least 6 months hence)

School Kits (All new items):

- 1 solar calculator
- 4 wide-lined, 70-count, 3-hole notebooks
- 4 ball point pens
- 1 protractor
- 1 metric ruler
- 1 Bible or \$5 to buy one

This is a fund raiser for our UMW, so give generously to continue the services we provide Broadway and to support the missions of the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries for women, children, and youth. For instance, our

monetary contributions completely support our Broadway Church Day Camp at Marott Park.

At this writing, Pat Pearson and her dentist, Dr. David Wiener, and his assistant, Jessica Morris, have already contributed a large number of toothbrushes and a quantity of travel-sized tubes of toothpaste for the Christmas stockings. You and Santa already know what else to place in the Christmas stockings for every age group! The gold-banded, red felt stockings accommodate small toys, hair items, watches, nail polish, gel pens, crayons, and things you would give to your own child, but the items for babies vary exceedingly from those for teen boys.

You may also bring in your contributions for our Christmas store (such as the boxer shorts you were able to buy on sale and the toys you've been stockpiling in your attic). We hope you have not been able to pass the dry milk on your grocer's shelf without picking up a box for babies at Kissy Clinic. The Rev. Joe Wagner says Sierra Leone has been hard hit by the global recession, so I am again giving a scholarship for a school child in Sierra Leone as a Christmas gift to members of my own family. Scholarships are still a bargain at \$75 a semester; you receive a picture and information, but the recipient does not know who you are, so will not be contacting you.

CROP WALK FOR THE HUNGRY 2009

Jesus said, "I was hungry, and you gave me food." God has no hands on Earth but ours. God expects us to care for the hungry. The 2009 CROP Walk of Church World Service takes place Sunday, October 18th, with registration between 1:45 - 2:15 p.m. The walk begins and ends at the large tent on the west grounds of Christian Theological Seminary (42nd & Michigan Road). The route will cover about 3.5 miles, a route through the beautiful Butler area, designed to be handicapped accessible to accommodate wheel chairs, baby

buggies, strollers, and wagons carrying children. Dogs and other pets are welcomed but must be on a leash. If you can be a CROP Walker, please contact Phyllis Newton at (317) 255-8116 or pick up a CROP Walk envelope from Jeffery Perkins in the church office.

Thanks, Broadway, for making our congregation 13th in the Top Walk Groups in 2008 (of 87 groups from all faiths) with a total of \$2,498 raised to fight hunger. Eighty-six church groups raised \$124,759.58 in 2008. Phyllis Newton was among the Top Ten Walkers (of 1,200 walkers) with a total of \$1,354.00. Our five walkers -- Mark DeVore, Mike Nix, Margaret Pengilly, Shirley Shazer, and Phyllis Newton -- averaged \$497.80 per person. Broadway first participated in CROP Walk in 1989, and Broadway walkers have walked every year since 1992.

CHURCH TRIVIA: You may recall that St. Luke's UMC, which contributed \$840 in 2007 to the CROP Walk with six walkers, challenged Second Presbyterian Church, who contributed \$4,495.96 in 2007 with 21 walkers to each church generating 100 walkers in 2008. St. Luke's 84 walkers brought in \$7,817 in 2008, while Second Presbyterian's 86 walkers netted \$7,357. Hurrah, St. Luke's! North UMC, second only to First Mennonite, brought in \$8,162! Three cheers for North Church!

CHURCH TRIVIA: Four local hunger-fighting programs will receive grants from Church World Service equivalent to one-fourth of the money raised in the 2009 CROP Walk -- Gleaners Food Bank, Second Helpings, Indiana Christian Leadership Conference, St. Vincent de Paul, and Church Federation of Greater Indianapolis.

CHURCH TRIVIA: Pantries in Fletcher Place Community Center (a United Methodist Metro Ministry) and Mid-North Pantry each will receive part of the canned and boxed food walkers take to the CROP Walk before starting the walk.

Important Tax Info: Year End 2009

Thursday, December 31st, 2009, will be the final day Broadway United Methodist Church is able to receive contributions for credit on your 2009 statement. PLEASE NOTE, however, that if you plan to hand deliver a final 2009 contribution, the Church office will be closed on December 31. If you plan to deliver a final contribution in person, it must be in the office before 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, December 30th, 2009.

The IRS specifies:

- Checks dated on or before December 31st, 2009, and received in the church office by that date OR postmarked December 31st, 2009 (received in due course in 2010), will be credited as 2009 giving;
- Any check dated December 31st, 2009, but received in a Sunday offering after January 1st, 2010 will be credited as a 2010 contribution;
- Securities given to Broadway Church must be in an account in Broadway's name on December 31, 2009, to receive credit on your 2009 statement.

IMPORTANT: To ensure deductibility of your church contributions, please do not file your 2009 income tax return until you have received the printed statement of your contributions from Broadway's office.

Consider Electronic Giving!

Broadway Church now offers electronic giving for those who would like to use this option. Electronic funds transfer (EFT) allows your weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly contributions for the General Budget to be transferred from your checking or savings account directly to the church account. If you are away for a period of time, or cannot attend church on a particular Sunday, your pledge will continue to be received and consistently contribute to the work of Broadway, giving the Church a more predictable income throughout the year. A simple, easy to use authorization form is available at the church office, or you may sign up via the Broadway website by clicking on "Donations."
